
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Prez Says

We stopped on the side of the road before splitting up, reorganized a bit, and off we went. I led the larger group (17 people, 11 cars) to Florence, and 3 more Florence area members met us when we got to the deli for lunch.

Tech Session at Aaron's AutoWerks

Our Spring Tech Session at **Aaron's Autowerks** filled the house this year. There were neat cars and enthusiastic people all over the place. I got there a tad late so, if there had been any jelly-filled doughnuts in those boxes, I missed out.

Aaron thanked us for our support and emphasized his maintenance and special projects business. In particular, we heard a good review of the IMS bearing issue and how they have changed out quite a few of these for customers. An important point was that these cars need to be driven, often. I know, we've heard this before but it's true. As an example, the 930 on the lift was one that had super low mileage but was undergoing expensive maintenance (engine out, transaxle rebuild) because of more time in reverence than in revving.

Next up, Michael Hernandez laid out the three-year engine rebuild odyssey that followed his complete engine failure. These things, engine rebuilds that is, aren't cheap and I got the impression that his wife, Barbara, was probably more than simply supportive in making it all happen. The failure was eventually found to be the result of a cracked head. Finding a good used replacement was a part of the odyssey, the other being that Michael decided to upgrade from the 3.4 to a 3.6 litre configuration. Power corrupts.



Coincidently, or maybe not, next door sits **Vintage Sportscar Restorations** and they were holding an open house. Vintage focuses on early 911 restorations and it was fun to see the works in progress on a number of these cars. One or two of them were being brought up to a spec way beyond normal production issue, more like the ones you read about in those Porsche magazines. Power corrupts.
